Nomination Deadlines	Fall Semester or Academic Year: March 1 Spring Semester: September 15
Application Deadlines	Fall Semester or Academic Year: March 15 Spring Semester: October 1
Application Procedure	Please see the website above Students should complete the online application form and upload all required documents to their application only <u>after</u> receiving the nomination confirmation e-mail from BUSA. All documents can be uploaded to the application with the exception of the passport photocopy, which should be submitted via <u>SecureMail</u> .
Language Requirements	Boston University is unable to accept any exchange student who does not meet the minimum English language requirements to attend. Requirements can be viewed by clicking on "English Proficiency Testing Results" section at: (*Duolingo English Test is now accepted) <u>http://www.bu.edu/admissions/apply/international/application- instructions/</u>
Application Outcome	Accepted students will be notified within 2-3 weeks of the application deadline via email, with a copy to the home university coordinator.
Intensive English Program	An intensive English language program (CELOP) is available to students whose English proficiency does not meet BU's standards for exchange students. Details can be found at <u>http://www.bu.edu/celop/</u> . Please note that CELOP is not part of the exchange program.

Acceptance Procedures	As noted above, accepted students will be notified by email. The Program Manager for Exchanges will send information for accepted non-US citizens to the ISSO for visa documents (Form DS-2019) to be issued. This process takes several weeks after decisions are sent.
Acceptance Packet	Students will receive detailed acceptance information via email. Non- US citizens also receive a packet containing the Form DS-2019 and J-1 visa application instructions (sent to the home university, if Covid restrictions allow). The home university distributes this information to each student so they can apply for the visa as early as possible.
Medical Forms	All admitted students will receive, via email, a packet of medical forms that must be completed by a doctor and submitted to BU Student Health Services by the start of the semester. Proof of Covid vaccination is required.

Visas

Visa Type	Exchange students who are not U.S. citizens must have a J-1 visa to study at BU.
Visa Application	Detailed instructions for the visa application will be included in the packet sent to the home university along with the necessary Form DS-2019 and official acceptance letter.

ISSO Check-In	Soon after arrival at BU, exchange students must complete a check-in process with the International Students and Scholars Office (either in- person, or electronically, as they advise.)

Working in the U.S.	Students should review the information here: <u>http://www.bu.edu/isso/employment-internships/</u> *Regular on-campus employment is not permitted. Further questions about eligibility to work in the U.S. should be directed to the ISSO.
Visa Dates and Student Travel Plans	The visa start and end dates will roughly coincide with semester dates. Students traveling on a J-1 visa can enter the U.S. up to 30 days before their visa start date and must depart the U.S. within 30 days after their visa end date. More information on entering the U.S. can be found here: <u>http://www.bu.edu/isso/travel-visas/entering-the-u-s/</u> . *Covid testing may be required prior to boarding flights or entry into the United States.
	If students plan to come to the U.S. more than 30 days before the visa start date, they must enter as a tourist, then leave and re-enter on the visa within the 30-day window. <i>Further questions should be directed to the ISSO, especially regarding early arrival for a CELOP or summer program.</i>
U.S. Passport Holders	Any student who has a U.S. passport must enter the U.S. using that passport when they come to study at BU. They must not obtain a visa or enter on a foreign passport.



Arrival and Orientation

Exchange students participate in the Boston University Orientation program for all new students. Orientation information will be provided to all accepted students, either in their acceptance packet or via email. Arrival Dates	All students should arrive in time to attend BU Orientation (dates below). On-campus housing is available for move-in on the first day of orientation for students who have registered for orientation and applied for BU housing.
BU Orientation Dates	Fall 2023: August 30 - September 1, 2023 *tentatively Spring 2024: 2-3 weekdays prior to the first day of classes
Orientation Program Details	Details about BU Orientation will be e-mailed and also posted online at http://www.bu.edu/orientation . A special section will be included for with information specifically for international exchange students.
Airport	The closest airport to BU is Boston Logan International (airport code BOS). From Logan Airport, students can take the free SL1 bus to South Station. At South Station, board the MBTA Red Line subway train inbound (towards downtown). Switch at Park Street station to the Green Line ('B' train outbound to Boston College; upstairs), and ride to the Boston University stops. Other Transportation	Taxis are available directly from Logan Airport; \$40-\$50; 30-40 minutes Uber and Lyft ride shares pick up at Logan Airport, as well.
Checking In	Visit <u>https://www.bu.edu/housing/</u> for information on how and when students can check-in to BU residences. Students are responsible for arranging their own accommodations prior to move-in day. * <i>Reservations are required</i> .
ISSO Check-In	All international students must check in with the International Students and Scholars Office (ISSO) soon after arriving. The ISSO is located in the same office as Study Abroad: 888 Commonwealth Avenue, 2 nd floor. <i>*ISSO will advise on any changes due to Covid-19.</i>



Academics

Boston University is home to over 250 academic programs, managed by almost 20 schools and colleges. Exchange students have the opportunity to take classes across most of the BU curriculum, including our College of Arts and Sciences, College of Communication, College of Engineering, and Questrom School of Business.

Class Schedule	The class schedule for the upcoming semester is available online to accepted students only. A BU student account is required to log in to view the schedule.
Credits and Full-Time Status	Most Boston University classes are worth 4 credits. Exchange students must register for at least 12 BU credits per semester to maintain full- time status, though a typical course-load is 16 credits. The maximum course load exchange students may carry is 18 credit hours per term.
Contact Hours	Classroom-based courses are typically assigned 1 credit per 1 scheduled contact hour per week. Each credit assigned includes an expectation of at least 2 hours of independent student effort per week for successful completion of the course. Restrictions	 Not available to exchange students: All classes in the School of Medicine School of Dental Medicine School of Law Kilachand Honors College Very limited availability to exchange students: Graduate courses in some programs (communications, business, psychology, and economics, among others). Qualified students who meet all pre-requisites can try to gain entry, but space is limited. Fine Arts courses – often available to BU Art majors only.
Course Registration	Registration for BU courses is done online in the months before the student arrives at BU. Detailed instructions will be sent in the students' acceptance packets and via e-mail. Some courses do not offer online registration; for these, the Program Manager for Exchanges will provide registration assistance. Students can modify their class schedules during the Add/Drop period at the beginning of the semester.
Class Types	Most BU classes are one-part ("independent"), though some are multi- part and may include a lecture, discussion, and/or lab component. Students should pay attention to this when registering to ensure that they register for all components of each class.
Assessment and Grading	Students may refer to <u>http://www.bu.edu/reg/grades/explanation-of-grades/</u> for an explanation of the grading system. BU classes involve graded homework, quizzes, essays, and exams throughout the semester as well as a large presentation, research paper, or exam at the end of the semester. Final grades represent a weighted average of these components. Many professors also consider class participation when assigning grades.

After completion of a semester at BU, students can access unofficial copies of their transcripts by logging into their student account. Students may arrange to have an official version of their transcript sent to their home institution by visiting http://www.bu.edu/reg/grades/ordering-a-transcript/

BU Housing and Dining

BU maintains a variety of on-campus housing options. Exchange students are guaranteed on-campus housing at BU. Students who opt to live off-campus are responsible for finding their own housing. *Covid-19 restrictions may have altered on-campus housing placement, but it is still guaranteed to those who apply for it by the deadline. On-Campus Housing	Most students live in a room with one roommate and shared bathroom facilities. Students can request another style of accommodation on- campus (single room, apartment, or suite style) but these housing options are in high demand and exchange students should be prepared for the probability that they will be assigned to dormitory-style housing with a roommate. On some occasions, accommodation may be provided in a nearby hotel for the semester, if all on-campus rooms are full. All on-campus housing is close to class locations and easily accessible by public transportation.
Off-Campus Housing	Students can choose to rent an apartment in the city of Boston alone or with a roommate. Students must arrange that housing on their own. BU Study Abroad does not provide assistance with off-campus housing placements and cannot vouch for the validity of any private housing contract. Housing Guarantee Payment	All students who will live in on-campus housing must pay a non-refundable Housing Guarantee Payment before they can be assigned to a room. Dining Plans	All exchange students (whether living on- or off-campus) have the option of purchasing a BU Dining plan. Details of the plans are available here: http://www.bu.edu/housing/dining/
On-Campus Dining	BU maintains several on-campus dining facilities which range from large cafeteria-style spaces with a broad variety of offerings, to small restaurant-style options including Starbucks. Fees	Students pay for their housing and dining through their online student accounts (Student Link). Housing and Dining fee schedules can be found here: <u>http://www.bu.edu/housing/living/rates/</u>
Convenience Points	In addition to or instead of a dining plan, students can purchase BU convenience points. These points are loaded onto the students' ID cards ("Terrier Cards") and can be used to purchase food and supplies at on-campus venues.
